Church of England chapel & Robing Room	The site of the Church of England Robing Room. Erected December 1903. Destroyed by fire 1975. The Friends of Gore Hill cemetery.	On path CB, between paths 54 & 56.
Hales. Edna Maude	In loving memory of our mother Edna Maude Hales of Mosman. 5.7.1916 – 19.6.1999.	On seat. Situated on path CB, opposite path 70.
Jacques. Elizabeth Rose	<i>(Metal plaque affixed to a memorial seat)</i> In memory of Elizabeth Rose Jacques "Cobby" 30/11/1911 - 20/03/1995.	On seat. Situated on path CB, opposite path 72
Masonic foundation stone	<i>(Metal plaque affixed to the top of the stone.)</i> In memory of all Masonic Brethren who are buried in Gore Hill Cemetery. This stone came from the Masonic temple - Lodge Rawson - which stood opposite the cemetery. March 1993. <i>(Original Inscription on the stone.)</i> Rawson Masonic Hall. This Foundation stone was laid by The Worshipful Hugh Montgomerie-Hamilton, Grand-Master, and Officers of the U.G.L.N.S.W. on the 18th day of Sept. 1909. Architect J. S. Wigram, W.M., W. V. Thomas, S.W., W. Winson, Treas., E. R. Lanceley. Builder, H. W. Audsley.	On path AH, opposite path 13
Sisters of St.Joseph	<i>(Plaque 1.)</i> The place whereon you stand is Holy ground: Exodus 3: 4,5. The body of Mary MacKillop (Mother Mary of the Cross.) Australian-born foundress of the Sisters of St.Joseph of the Sacred Heart was interred here from August 1909 to January 1914 when it was transferred to Mary MacKillop Memorial Chapel North Sydney. Many of her early followers remain buried in this place. R.I.P. The Friends of Gore Hill Cemetery. 1987. <i>(Plaque 2.)</i> This obelisk was erected by the Gore Hill Memorial Cemetery Trust with assistance from the Department of Conservation and Land Management, the Ministry for the Status and Advancement of Women, St Ignatius College (Riverview), the St.Leonards business community, the North Sydney College of TAFE, and The Friends of Gore Hill Cemetery, to commemorate the beatification of Mother Mary MacKillop on 19 January 1995 at Sydney by Pope John Paul II	On path 74 in RCO portion
Size/Bourke.	This monument was restored with funds provided by the Heritage Council of NSW, the Gore Hill Memorial Cemetery Trust, The Friends of Gore Hill Cemetery. June 1999.	On path CE, between paths 79 & 80.
Tunks. William	William Tunks, 1816-1883. Grandson of William Tunks, Marine HMS Sirius 1788. Member of NSW Legislative Assembly 1864-1874. First Mayor of St.Leonards (North Sydney) 1867-1883. Founder of St.Leonards Park and Gore Hill Cemetery. Grave restored October 1987 by Tunks Descendants Association.	On path CA, ,between 63 & 64.
Linton. Sarah Anne	Sarah Anne Linton. (1852-1916). New Zealand Pioneer. Sarah's parents, Mary Jemima (née Duncan) and Richard Kibblewhite, had reached Port Nicholson aboard the "Clifton" in 1842 and had been granted land at Masterton where Sarah was born on 23 November 1852. On 3 May 1869 Sarah married a special constable, James Linton, who was organising local defences against Maori attack and was subsequently appointed a land agent. Late in 1870, Sarah, James and their infant daughter Jane, made the arduous journey on horseback via the Wairarapa and Manawatu Gorge to an area which was later to become the city of Palmerston North. There she bore another daughter and eleven sons. James played a	On path 14, corner AD.

	<p>leading role in the growth of the town, as mayor twice, and in other official capacities. The family came to Sydney in 1897 for their son's education. Sarah died at McMahons Point on 22 August 1916. James died on 6 November 1907 and is buried in row 9. This plaque was set in place in the year 2002 by her family and the Palmerston North City Council.</p>	
Linton. James & Fred	<p>James Linton (1839-1907). New Zealand Pioneer.</p> <p>Born at Dumfries, Scotland on 25.7.1839, James arrived at Queenstown, New Zealand about 1860 and spent 10 years on the goldfields. Having joined the special constabulary, he later helped organise defences against Maori attacks in Masterton where he married Sarah Anne Kibblewhite on 3.5.1869. Appointed as land agent, James with Sarah and infant daughter Jane, then made the arduous journey on horseback up the Wairarapa, through the Manawatu Gorge to the site selected for the new town of Palmerston North, arriving there in late 1870. For the next 27 years he served the town in many capacities. He was the second mayor 1879-82 and also 1884-85. Today a suburb, an army base and a street bear his name. James moved his family to Sydney in 1897. He died at McMahons Point on 6.11.1907. He is buried here with his son Fred who died on 17.10.1903.
